- Citation: with the approbation of the Commander in Chief of the American Expeditionary Forces in France the Marshall of France, Commander in Chief of the French Armies of the East, cites in the Order of the Army.
- Corporal Nicholas E Brown No 1490040, 142 Reg Inf “Displayed great bravery during the attack of October 8, 1918, near St Etienne, unhesitatingly advanced over uncovered terrain in spite of violent artillery and machine gunfire. With his comrade, he contributed towards the success of the operation by capturing enemy positions. Died of wounds received during the attack.” At General HQ, April 1, 1919 The Marshal of France, Commander in Chief of the French Armies of the East. PETAIN.
